

Wordlist for schools and communities

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Languages — Resource guide



This list suggests words that could create the basis for language teaching and learning in school communities. It includes topics and themes that are both suitable for everyday use in the school community and for developing into units of work. The topics are:

Words within each topic have been arranged based on difficulty and availability of vocabulary. The relevant level is indicated by shading in the left column: white for beginner, pale for elementary and medium for lower intermediate.

Some words have been formed after colonialisation. They may differ from other words in the language. The tables containing these words have a note at the start, and the words are preceded by an asterisk (*).

The language and associated cultural knowledge belongs to the respective groups and the authenticity and use of such knowledge should be negotiated with communities, particularly Elders and other custodians, who should be included in a school's Language Reference Group.

This list is not prescriptive. Schools are encouraged to work in partnership with their communities to incorporate words that are contextualised to their community setting and reflect the language of country, including the local landscape and features of the environment.
