Definition of dependent arising (paticcasamupada)

This is the belief that everything that is in existence exists because other things are in existence. Therefore, everything is interconnected, and everything affects everyone.

Paticcasamupada also relates to the principle of conditionality. This means that everything, whether mental or physical, exists and occurs because of the presence of certain conditions. Everything is dependent on other things.

Context

Dependent arising is part of the Buddhist theory underpinning the Three Marks of Existence or the Three Universal Truths.

Stimulus 2

Excerpt from 'No-self or Not-self?'

The Buddha advised paying no attention to such questions as 'Do I exist?' or 'Don't I exist?' for however you answer them, they lead to suffering and stress.

To avoid the suffering implicit in questions of 'self' and 'other,' he offered an alternative way of dividing up experience: the four Noble Truths of stress, its cause, its cessation, and the path to its cessation. Rather than viewing these truths as pertaining to self or other, he said, one should recognize them simply for what they are, in and of themselves, as they are directly experienced, and then perform the duty appropriate to each.

. . .

In this sense, the anatta teaching is not a doctrine of no-self, but a not-self strategy for shedding suffering by letting go of its cause, leading to the highest, undying happiness. At that point, questions of self, no-self, and not-self fall aside.

Context

Anatta is the Buddhist teaching that there is no permanent 'self' contained in human or animal bodies. Thanissaro Bhikkhu is an American Buddhist monk of the Thai Forest Tradition in the Theravada school of Buddhism. He has translated the *Dhammapada* and the *Sutta Pitaka* into English and has written numerous study guides and commentaries on the dharma.

Excerpt from Teshuvah

Just as the Creator desired that [the elements of] fire and wind rise upward and [those of] water and earth descend downward, that the heavenly spheres revolve in a circular orbit, and all the other creations of the world follow the nature which He desired for them, so too, He desired that man have free choice and be responsible for his deeds, without being pulled or forced.

Context

Teshuvah, or *The Ways of Repentance*, was written by Maimonides in the 12th century as a guide to true repentance for Jewish adherents. The text focuses on how repentance is about returning to God.

Stimulus 4

Colossians 3:12

As God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience.

Context

The letter of St Paul to the Colossians is the twelfth book in the New Testament. The letter was written to the early Christian community in Colossae, a city in Phrygia (now southern Turkey), during the late 1st century.

Excerpt from the Quran, al-Baqarah 2:40-45

- 40. ... Remember My blessings which I bestowed upon you, and fulfill your pledge to Me, and I will fulfill My pledge to you, and fear Me.
- 41. And believe in what I revealed, confirming what is with you; and do not be the first to deny it; and do not exchange My revelations for a small price; and be conscious of Me.
- 42. And do not mix truth with falsehood, and do not conceal the truth while you know.
- 43. And attend to your prayers, and practice regular charity, and kneel with those who kneel.
- 44. Do you command people to virtuous conduct, and forget yourselves, even though you read the Scripture? Do you not understand?
- 45. And seek help through patience and prayer.

Al-Baqarah ('The Heifer') is the longest chapter in the Quran and provides guidance about religious law in everyday life. This chapter also retells the stories of Adam, Ibrahim and Musa.

I was told that we do evil because we choose to do so of our own free will, and suffer it because your justice rightly demands that we should. I did my best to understand this, but I could not see it clearly ... When I chose to do something or not to do it, I was quite certain that it was my own self, and not some other person, who made this act of will.

Stimulus 9

Excerpt from Nobel Prize telephone interview with Kailash Satyarthi

First of all, everyone must acknowledge and feel that child slavery still exists in the world, in its ugliest face and form. And this is an evil, which is crime against humanity, which is intolerable, which is unacceptable and which must go. That sense of recognition must be developed first of all. And secondly there is a need of higher amounts of political will. There is a need of higher amount of corporate engagement, and the engagement of the public towards it. So, everybody has a responsibility to save and protect the children on this planet.
